Elephant

The Bible tells us in Romans 5:7, *"God demonstrates his own love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us."*

It was written about Jesus in Matthew 12:20, “*A bruised reed he will not break and a smoldering wick he will not snuff out.*” This means that Jesus will not use His great power as the Son of God to crush weak people whose lives are damaged. Instead Jesus will mend our sinful, broken lives.
