Under the guidance of the Good Shepherd, we have reclined upon the green pastures and have been led to the still waters. Every need of body and soul has been provided for in abundant measure, sufficient and enough for each day. In due time, the hand of the Lord has been opened to satisfy the longing soul and the yearning spirit, been shepherded along as we have paths of righteousness. The time comes when we must turn our steps upward and homeward. But before the time of fulfillment, we must pass through the valley – the valley of the shadow of death.
